"THE GRAPEVINE" FROM THE DESK OF Mike Walcker

This is one of the most competitive business I have ever seen. It's a business where signs go up, signs come down, and it's not uncommon to see a truck from any corner of the state show up anywhere else in the state. The WSP has rotational zones, but even then, you could get an owners request for a company that is out of that zone, as long as the arrival time is reasonable, and a driver from Tacoma might be at an accident scene with a driver from Seattle or Olympia and they may know each other well, or they may have never met. It would be like a Trooper from Yakima showing up at an accident scene with Troopers from Vancouver on I-5, not knowing each other, and not even having experience working on an interstate. There is somewhat of a "dance" that has to go on in order for things to go smoothly.

So what makes it possible for those incidents to go smoothly, and what is the common thread that we can all look for that will help us navigate difficult situations with people we don't know? In the case of the Troopers, it's the common training and uniform that gives them the confidence that the other person is going to react and perform in a predictable way. That should be the common thread with towers. It should be common training and understanding of the job at hand that should make any driver comfortable working with other drivers. The common uniform of a tow truck driver, the common language and terms of the industry, and by all means, a common respect and a shared feeling of a brotherhood amongst drivers should be the order of the day.

But in all too many cases, there is that competitive barrier, the feeling that the other guy is taking money out of your pocket, that they don't operate the way you do, and in many cases, just plain dislike of the other guy. So how do we make things better? Well, for starters, it starts at the top, with the boss. If the boss continually complains about other companies, the employees will (continued on Page 3)

reflect these feelings on the road. We should always put our best efforts forward when it comes to working with our fellow towers. Training together is another way to get drivers to work together as a team, despite working for different companies. Being members of our association is a common thread and meetings and parties go a long way in making friends out of competitors. There is truly NOTHING more satisfying than to see a group of competitors sitting at a table sharing a laugh and a meal, talking about their kids, dogs, vacations, and just getting along. There is truly nothing that does our industry more good than to have those bonds between members, and to stand together as an industry. We will always be better together as a team, as no man is an Island.

In 1993, he moved to the Wenatchee Valley. On November 13, 1993, he married ShamRae Signor in Okanogan, WA. They made their home in East Wenatchee, WA. Chris was a hard worker, working numerous jobs, including ranch hand, operator of paving equipment, and vehicle recovery specialist for Randy's Towing. He enjoyed the outdoors and was an avid fisherman and hunter. He enjoyed spending time at Wenatchee Valley Super Oval.

He is survived by his wife, ShamRae Strain, one son, Kalab Strain, and one daughter, Mackelci Strain, all of East Wenatchee; his father and step-mother, Mack and Cherryll Strain of Lubbock, TX; his mother, Kathryn Strain of East Wenatchee; two brothers, Mathew Strain of Cashmere, WA and Stephen Strain of East Wenatchee; and one sister, Michelle Dobson of Wenatchee.

Above is an original 42 star Washington Statehood flag.. And this it the 125th anniversary of Washington becoming a state in 1889. Stu loaned it to the Washington Secretary of State's office for this year. Attached is a photo of Stu speaking at the November 11th Statehood celebration with Secretary of State Kim Wyman listening (she's in red). The flag is 6-1/2 feet by 13 feet and one of the largest still in existence.

Also on exhibit in the Secretary of States office from Stu's collection are an 1889 Legislative Manual from the First Legislature and some artifacts commemorating the 150th Anniversary of President Lincolns Assassination. A derringer similar to Booths, a scrap of Mary Todd Lincoln's Mourning Dress and a fragment of wallpaper from the room where Lincoln died.. Additionally there are period pictures of Lincoln and Booth and the funeral procession for Lincoln in New York city.

Stu is on the Washington State Heritage Center Board of Trustees appointed by former Secretary of State Sam Reed and retained by current Secretary of State Kim Wyman and also on the Board of Trustees of Centralia College appointed by Governor Christine Gregoire. They have around 2,500 students in Associates, Technical Certificate and Bachelors degree programs including the only Bachelors program in Diesel Technology other than the University of Montana -Havre West of the Mississippi. Stu has been the TRAW lobbyist for over 20 years and also lobbies for other groups and companies. Stu was a State Legislator and a State Senator, one of the few people elected to both sides of the isle.
